Group Project



Through his work organizing the Pop Culture stage from the last Porchfest, I got to meet up-and-coming rocker, Alex Remington and I recently got a chance to talk to him and Jacob Brown from the local trio Group Project.

I had heard some buzz about these dudes on social media and from sold-out shows they played in the area. I ask Alex how it came together. He tells me that the third member

Jeremy Harbec had seen schoolmate Jacob sing on Facebook. Jeremy had been producing EDM (Electronic Dance Music) beats on his computer. Alex tells me, "Jeremy texted Jacob and said 'We're going to make a pop banger by the end of next year.'" That tune titled 'Drinking Games' got 20k plays on SoundCloud.

Soon after that Alex met Jeremy while working at the Hudson IGA. Alex says, "I heard Jeremy was producing, I said 'Hey I play guitar we should get together.'" Alex checked out a beat Jeremy had been working on, and then added a guitar riff. "It just worked," he said. Soon after that, they began collaborating as a trio to write and produce songs. In 2018 they had six songs up on Spotify with several thousand plays, and a growing fan base of high school and college kids in Canada and the United States.

This work, some moxie, and some good luck got them a meeting with music industry veteran Stephane McGarry who ultimately signed a management deal with Group Project. The first thing they did was take their songs off Spotify to revamp them. Jacob says, "Though we had a fan base we had developed, ultimately it was the best decision... backtracking to take a big step forward." Stephane hired session players to do drum, bass and guitar tracking. They added some production elements. "It made us more credible, the quality was better," says Alex.

That work paid off – they now have millions of streams on Spotify, and fans all over the world. There are 15 releases up there now, and it is all ear candy. Every tune is a sculpted soundscape with a fat groove and a compelling story. You will tap your foot and smile.

The trio began playing sold-out shows, including at the Fairmount Theatre and Chez Maurice. The pandemic hit a few months later and put everything on hold. Alex tells me that the band took the time off to work on their craft and to write more songs. He says, "I became a better player, Jacob became a better singer, and Jeremy became a better producer. The songs are better." Their best results happen when they are working together. "It really is a group project."

Their new single 'Flowers in the Garden' is set to drop Friday, February 11. The guys tell me it's an upbeat feel-good tune made to sing along with. The song can be pre-saved on all the streaming platforms, so it pops onto your library at midnight. Jacob tells me, "It's very important for the artist to get those pre-saves; it helps with the algorithm and to get you on playlists."
